### Fraser First Booster Club

Fraser First Booster Club, Inc. is a non-profit organization to benefit parks in the City of Fraser. Currently, Fraser First Booster Club's is working with the Fraser Parks and Recreation to create a barrier-free park and playground at McKinley Park, located on Grove Street between Masonic and 13 Mile Road Just East of Hayes. What is a barrier-free park? A barrier-free park is a park which all of the design elements are accessible to all children and their families.

**Grant Updates:** The City of Fraser in conjunction with the Fraser First Booster Club was awarded an in part grant from the Michigan Land and Water Conservation Fund to help fund Phase 2 of the McKinley project – the Playground! The LWCF project totals \$200,000 and will add the much anticipated playground to McKinley Park. A community build will be scheduled following the completion of grant agreement. ## CURBSIDE RECYCLING

Curbside recycling is continuing in the City of Fraser. The items that can be placed in the recycling bins are as follows: (#1 and #2) plastics (flattened), glass jars and bottles (clear, green and brown), household plastics (#3 - #7) empty containers only, kitchen cookware (pots and pans), metal and aluminum cans, steel & tin cans, empty cans only (flattened), newspapers remove string and rubber bands, bundled or in brown paper bags), paperboard (no waxed coated paperboard i.e. cereal boxes), junk mail (envelopes, flyers, brochures, postcards, etc.) office paper, plastic bags, phone books, magazines & catalogs (no glossy covers), cardboard (flatten cardboard and cut into pieces). **Clear plastic bags can be used for additional items if your bin is full.** Please remember to rinse out all containers and remove the labels if possible before placing them in your bin. Styrofoam and batteries can be dropped off at the Department of Public Works, 31250 Kendall Monday through Friday between the hours of 7 a.m. to 3 p.m. New residents that have not received a recycling bin can call the office and the bin will be delivered to your home. Residents that need a replacement bin will be charged a \$10.00 replacement fee. **Residents can now receive a new 64 gallon recycling container from Rizzo Services at no cost. To obtain a recycle container or for more information contact Rizzo Services at 1-866-772-8900.** Unacceptable items are as follows: paper milk or juice cartons, Styrofoam containers/packing, garbage, propane tanks, paint cans (Latex paint can be placed out with regular refuse as long as the paint is dried up with sand or kitty litter. Oil base paint must be taken to the Hazardous Waste Division), colored glass, medical waste, flammable liquids, household cleaners and wood items.

## GARBAGE AND COMPOST COLLECTION

Rizzo Services is contracted by the city to pick up the garbage, compost and recycling. There is a separate truck for each collection. Rizzo Services also picks up the bulk items such as stoves, furniture, refrigerators, wood (50 lbs or less, nails removed or pounded down), carpeting (rolled and tied under 4 ft). **If a problem arises with your pickup, please call Rizzo Services at (866) 772-8900.** Rizzo Services will automatically pick up the items as long as they are set out with your regular garbage before 7 a.m. that morning. Items that are not set out will not be picked up until the following week. Appliances must either have the doors removed or tied shut for safety.

If you do gather grass clippings for collection, please follow this guideline. Due to state regulations for compost pickup, the following procedures must be complied by. The compost pickup program started March 21st, 2016 and will continue through Friday December 9th, 2016.

- Place at curb on your regular trash collection day.
- Place grass in open rubbish containers marked **"COMPOST"** or large **paper recycle bags**.
- Compost put in plastic bags will **not** be picked up – **no exceptions**.
- Place grass clippings separate from regular refuse collection.
- Make sure there is no other material mixed with grass, e.g. garbage or animal waste. If this material is present, grass clippings will not be collected.
- Rizzo will also take bushes **without roots** no longer than 3 foot. Place the bush at the curb on your garbage day.

The most cost efficient way to keep grass out of the waste stream is by mulching your lawns.

## **BELOW ARE THE HOLIDAYS THAT FALL ON A WEEK DAY FOR 2016 THAT COULD CHANGE YOUR TRASH PICK UP TO A DIFFERENT DAY. THE REST OF THE YEAR RIZZO TRASH PICKUP WILL BE THE NORMAL SCHEDULE DAYS:**

- **Labor Day: September 5th Monday-** Rizzo will be one day behind all week and will be picking up trash on Saturday.
- **Thanksgiving Day: November 26th Thursday-** Rizzo will collect garbage on the regular scheduled days Monday through Wednesday - Thursday will be picked up on Friday and Friday will be picked up on Saturday.
- **The weeks of Christmas and New Years** – Rizzo will pick up garbage on your regular scheduled day.

**If a holiday falls on a week-end day, trash will be picked up on your schedule day.**

Wood and logs may be taken to Mid Michigan Recycle, 24935 21 Mile Road, Macomb, (586)598-5807.

## HAZARDOUS WASTE MATERIALS

The Macomb County Health Department Household Hazardous Waste Program, located at 43524 Elizabeth Road, Mt. Clemens, will accept gardening, automotive and household products. The City of Fraser no longer accepts motor oil. This item can also go to Macomb County Hazardous Waste. Oil base paint must be taken to the Hazardous Waste Division. Call the hotline number at (586) 469-5236 in advance for disposal hours and for list of items accepted which also includes medication disposal.

## SANITARY SEWER BACK UP

If you experience a back up of a sewage disposal system, you must file a written claim with the City of Fraser Department of Public Works within 45 days after the backup was discovered. Notice should be mailed to City of Fraser DPW, 33000 Garfield, Fraser, MI 48026. Failure to provide the required notice will prevent recovery of damages. Contact the Fraser DPW immediately upon discovery of backup and the DPW will provide you with the necessary forms to make a claim.

## BRUSH AND MISCELLANEOUS PICKUP

The Department of Public Works is making every effort to pick up all brush on Friday of each week. Therefore, any brush to be picked up must be called into the DPW office at (586) 293-3100 extension #126 before 3:30 p.m. on Thursday of each week. Any calls after 3:30 p.m. on Thursday will be held for pickup on the Friday of the following week. Because of the large amount of calls received, pickups that are not called in will not be picked up. Please do not place items out until the DPW has been notified and date has been set for pickup. All brush shall be neatly piled at the curb with the butts of the limbs all facing the street. This pertains to tree limbs up to 3" in diameter and no longer than 6 foot long. There shall be no other rubbish, thorns or bushes in this pile; otherwise, it will not be picked up. There will be a \$35.00 fee for brush pickup for the first half hour and an additional \$35.00 for every half hour after.

Small twigs and branches can be cut in 3' lengths, then place the bundles at the curb. Smaller bush trimmings can be placed in the brown compost bags or in garbage containers marked compost and placed out on your regular garbage day.

All bushes which are removed from the ground with roots must have the roots removed. Stumps will not be picked up by the DPW. It is the responsibility of the homeowner to dispose

## FIRE HYDRANT FLUSHING

The DPW will be flushing out fire hydrants beginning the first of September throughout the city. Signs will be placed in the areas of the flushing. This will continue until the job is complete. You may experience brown water in your home. If you have done laundry and the water turned your clothing brown, the city has some stain remover that will take out the discoloration from your clothing. The stain remover is available for pick at the Department of Public Works at 31250 Kendall or in the finance department located at city hall. If you have any other concerns, you can contact the Department of Public Works at (586) 293-3100 Ext # 126.

## LEAF PICKUP PROGRAM

This is the new leaf program schedule for 2016. The DPW will be doing a random pickup starting October 3, 2016 through October 14, 2016 it will be a random pickup as piles accumulate, for the homes that have them raked out. The new schedule is as follows:

Section one will start on October 17th, 2016 and will continue for two weeks ending on October 28th, 2016. Section one consists of 15 Mile Road to 13 Mile Road and from Utica Road to Kelly Road and will be working from north to south.

Section two will start on October 31st, 2016 and will continue for two weeks ending on November 11th, 2016. Section two consists of 15 Mile Road to 13 Mile Road and from Utica Road to Hayes Road and will be working from north to south.

After this schedule is complete, the DPW crew will rotate back into section one for two weeks from November 14th, 2016 until November 25th, 2016 and then rotate back into section two for two weeks beginning November 28th, 2016 until December 9th, 2016. **THIS IS WHEN THE PROGRAM WILL END.**

This new schedule is due to the volume of leaves, time, and man power it takes to do this program. The program dates may move ahead of schedule a few days or behind schedule weather permitting.

For this program to succeed we need everyone's patients and we will get all the leaves picked up. Thank you advanced for your cooperation with this new leaf program.

## SNOW REMOVAL

Please be advised no person shall park any motor vehicle on any residential street within the City of Fraser between the hours of 9:00 a.m. and 4:00 p.m. between Monday and Friday if there is snow or ice on the ground to allow the department of public works to salt and plow the streets. This parking prohibition on residential streets for motor vehicles shall not apply to the Christmas holiday season from 12:01 a.m. December 24 through 12:01 January 2.

Your cooperation in moving your vehicles off the streets during inclement weather would be appreciated so that the entire street can be salted and/or plowed.

Whenever a vehicle becomes disabled for any reason on any street during a parking prohibition or snow emergency, the owner or person operating the vehicle shall take immediate action to have the vehicle towed or pushed off the street. No person shall abandon or leave the vehicle on the street, except for the purpose of securing immediate assistance; in such cases the person securing assistance shall leave the vehicle only for the time absolutely necessary to make contact for assistance and shall return to the vehicle immediately thereafter without delay.

## Do I Need a Permit?

### BUILDING PERMITS ARE REQUIRED FOR THE FOLLOWING:

- \*POOLS
- \*HOT TUBS / SPAS
- \*SHEDS
- \*FENCES
- \*DECKS
- \*APPROACHES
- \*ADDITIONS
- \*SIDEWALKS
- \*ROOF TEAR-OFF
- \*PORCHES
- \*ALL SIGNS
- \*FINISHED BASEMENT
- \*INFLATABLE POOLS (OVER 24" DEEP)

Remember that permits are also required for the following: furnaces ~ air conditioners ~ water heaters and all electrical, plumbing & mechanical work. Please contact the Building Department to check if a permit is required. Obtain required permits BEFORE work is started. Work started prior to issuance of a permit may result in penalty fees. Roof permits are required for all projects requiring a tear off. A third roof is not allowed on existing structures. VIOLATIONS of the above can result in the issuance of an ordinance violation with a court date, subject to the possibility of fines and other penalties.

## CODE ENFORCEMENT COMPLAINTS

1. The name, phone number, and address of the person making the complaint.
2. The address of the property in violation and a detailed description of the issue.

This information is required in order for Code Enforcement to efficiently investigate the issue. The Code Enforcement process may at times be a lengthy process, but the end result promotes pride in our town and encourages a higher level of property maintenance.

## DO I NEED A DOG LICENSE?

Yes, dog licenses are required for any dog 6 months or older. Licenses can be obtained at the Macomb County Animal Shelter located at:

## TRASH COLLECTION

1. Trash must be placed at the curb by 7am of the day of specified collection. No waste shall be placed at the curb or street for collection prior to 1:00 pm the afternoon before the scheduled collection day.
2. During the week when refuse is being stored and accumulated for ultimate disposal all refuse must be stored inside of a building or in an approved receptacle, behind the front building line.
3. After the collection of the waste the empty receptacle shall be removed from the curb by the owner, or occupant no later than 10 hours after collection has been made.



## SNOW & ICE REMOVAL

Each owner or occupant of any premises abutting a sidewalk shall remove all snow and ice from the sidewalk and keep it free from obstructions, encroachments, encumbrances, filth, rubbish, and other substances likely to cause injury to a person.

No person shall deposit snow, ice, or slush onto any street roadway, highway, public sidewalk, or public right-of-way.

No person shall deposit, place, shovel, or plow snow in such a manner as to block passage of pedestrian traffic on public sidewalks, streets, or right-of-ways. Fraser Ordinance prohibits snow, ice, or other obstructions from remaining on the above-mentioned areas and requires immediate removal. Failure to comply will require the City to remove this obstruction at your expense. The actual cost of removal will be charged to you plus an administrative fee of fifty dollars (\$50.00) per parcel.

## Neighborhoods That May Experience a Rodent Problem

Rodents are a problem that could impact an entire neighborhood. This is usually a result of only one or two property owners doing something improperly that contributes to the situation. Usually, these people are not even aware that they are part of the problem. Please be a part of the solution. Help keep your neighborhood RODENT-FREE by:

~~ Keeping garbage bags with foodstuffs enclosed in covered containers that have no holes. Plastic bags are not rodent proof. ~~ Keeping firewood and other materials properly stored at least 12 inches above the ground. ~~ Cleaning up animal droppings daily. ~ Clearing vegetation from below decks and replacing ground cover with a thin layer of visqueen or weed fabric, covered with peastone. ~~ Keeping bird feeders elevated at least 48 inches above ground. ~~ Not leaving pet food outdoors or storing in a garage or shed. ~~ Not allowing overgrowth of weeds, grass, or brush. ~~ Not leaving brush or rubbish piles on the ground. Dispose of grass clippings properly. ~~ Removing any sheds that were constructed without a ratwall. Don't leave anything directly on the ground that is large enough to allow tunneling below, creating harborage areas for rats.

Rodents need food and a place to nest. Without either of these, they will move away from the area. Proper, cautious applications of poisons are also effective means of elimination but please read the label and follow directions. ### FRASER SENIOR HOUSING

The City of Fraser has a Senior Housing Building. This is a 3 story, 75 units building with one and two bedroom rental apartments for independent senior living. Each apartment has a refrigerator, electric stove, dishwasher, disposal stacked washer-dryer and a patio or balcony. Each unit has individually controlled heat and air conditioning.

A one bedroom unit is 600 sq. ft. and the monthly rent is \$555.00 a two bedroom unit is 775 sq. ft. and the rent is \$635.00. Water and maintenance are included but tenant pays all other utilities. **There is a security deposit equal to one month's rent; this is returned to you when you move out. There could be a annual adjustment for the price of the apartment during the yearly budget.** Also, there is a non-refundable clean fee, equal to one month's rent. No pets are allowed. Rentals are not subsidized. On the second floor we have a community room where the tenants can gather to watch big screen TV, DVD movies, play cards, read, work puzzles or join in other activities with friends or family planned by the tenants.

We are located at 34950 Hidden Pine Drive off of 15 Mile Road and West of Utica.

### Registering To Vote

To register to vote, applicants must be U.S. Citizens and at least 18 years old on Election Day. Applicants also must be residents of Michigan and the City of Fraser. Voters can visit [WWW.Michigan.gov/vote](http://WWW.Michigan.gov/vote) for more information regarding the ballot and polling locations.

Voters may register by mail or in person at the Fraser Clerk's Office or by visiting any Secretary of State Office. The mail-in voter's registration form is available at [WWW.Michigan.gov/elections](http://WWW.Michigan.gov/elections). First-time voters who register by mail must vote in person in their first election, unless they hand-deliver the application to their local clerk, are 60 years old or older, are disabled, or are eligible to vote under the Uniformed and Overseas Citizens Absentee Voting Act.

### November 8, 2016

Citizens wanting to vote in the November General Election must register by October 11, 2016. On Election Day the polls will be open from 7:00am to 8:00pm.

### Absentee Voting

Absentee applications are available in the Clerk's Office. If you would like to be mailed an application, please contact the City Clerk's Office. The last day to receive an absentee ballot by mail is November 5th, 2016; the City Clerk's Office will be open from 10:00am to 2:00pm for any questions, comments, concerns, or requests regarding the election.

Anyone over the age of 60 may request to be placed on a permanent list to receive an application automatically. Voters on this list will receive an application for an absentee ballot prior to the election. If you wish to participate in the election, simply sign the application and return it to the City Clerk's Office, a ballot will be mailed to you as soon as it is available.

### Election Inspectors

The Clerk's Office is always accepting applications for election inspectors. Election inspectors are people who are paid to assist voters at the polls on Election Day.
